## Message from the Dean



As we seek a new director for Extension, we can reflect on a number of challenges that we have faced in recent years, particularly with respect to field programs. Among these challenges have been an unexpected budget reallocation in FY 2017, an audit that said we needed to focus on financial compliance and management structure, and the general image of Extension within the university. I am happy to say that in 2019, we have a much stronger system. As I have always said, our “front door,” where our agents and staff meet our clientele, is excellent. Our problems were with financial management and the amount of supervision and support we were able to provide at the county level. We are also lucky to have outstanding faculty specialists who are at the

top of their game.

As of today, we have received a report from UK Internal Audit that recognizes the specific progress made in financial compliance and the plan to provide a more supportive management structure. I see this as a very good audit report, and I thank everyone in the system for their help.

We will soon have a new director, a consultant’s report on management structure that we will review and implement, an announcement on the statewide return on investment from Extension, and some outstanding new collaborations with other

UK colleges. Another way I think about this is that we have always been the front door to UK, but now other colleges at UK are seeing partnership opportunities for outreach and student recruiting. I believe that county offices can and do provide an avenue for recruiting students to UK and look forward to expanded opportunities in college readiness preparation as well as recruitment. The fact that we have an extension philanthropy director is a huge plus as we transform our public face and solidify support for our programs.

I am grateful to Provost Blackwell as well as President Capilouto and Executive Vice President Monday for listening to and understanding the unique and vital missions that these programs provide to the citizens of Kentucky. I appreciate our administration's willingness to consider the challenges we face in meeting the three land-grant missions – teaching, research and service –and the way we integrate those missions in everything that we do.

## Motor Pool update

UK Transportation Services is continuing its expansion of periphery parking along College Way near the Motor Pool. Ongoing construction and reallocation of existing spaces in this area has resulted in adjustments to Motor Pool operations, which limit anyone who rents vehicles to leaving only one personal vehicle in the fenced Motor Pool area. However, additional spaces are available immediately adjacent to the facility in the new College Way West parking lot. Individuals with a valid university parking permit (excluding remote tier) are authorized to park in this periphery designated lot.

While overall parking space has been reduced, there should be no impact to regular car rental operations. Cars and a limited number of minivans and SUVs are still available at the Motor Pool on College Way. However, all large vans and trucks have been moved to the college's Maine Chance Farm at 2349 Turner Place and can be picked up there 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Reservations are still handled through the current on-campus office, but keys for vehicles at the Maine Chance location must be picked up at the farm.

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## Spotlight

### David Williams

Director, Robinson Center for Appalachian Resource Sustainability



We asked David to share a little about his passions, his career path and what led him to us.

#### **Tell us about your background and what led you to your current roles at UK?**

I'm a native of West Virginia and came to Kentucky as an undergraduate at Eastern Kentucky University. I earned a bachelor's in Technical Horticulture there and began a career in turfgrass management. After a few years, my mentor at ECU suggested I consider an academic career and connected me with the turf and forage group at UK where I earned both my master's and doctorate. I joined the UK Agronomy faculty working in turf research and teaching from 1997 to 2015. In 2015, my research assignment became 100 percent hemp and my teaching assignment

broadened. In 2016, I became the director of the UK Robinson Center for Appalachian Resource Sustainability—a wonderful fit for me considering my own heritage. I remain at RCARS today with my research assignment still in hemp. I have enjoyed my role in hemp so very much. It has provided opportunities to me that would have otherwise never been available.

### **What is your favorite thing about working in CAFE?**

I'm clearly very biased, but in my opinion, RCARS is the best place in all of UK to work. The entire staff take their work deeply seriously. They want so very badly to contribute to the positive welfare of the people of Appalachia just as our mission statement requires. They genuinely care about our mission. It shows every single day. As a result, we have a wonderful relationship with our community and region. It is a very different role than the other sub-stations in the Experiment Station system, but I think in the most positive of ways. I genuinely love working here. It is my favorite thing about working in the CAFE by far.

### **What is one thing about yourself that might surprise people?**

I must use hearing aids if I am to communicate well with people who have voices in upper frequencies. My audiologist tells me this is due to my long history of attending rock concerts, I guess beginning in 1972 or so and continuing today. Most of those, of course, without any hearing protection at all and as near the stage as I could afford. I have no genetic disposition towards poor hearing at high frequencies. It is a common ailment of rock musicians. I still love rock shows, but I do use hearing protection now.
