Message from the Dean



As fall approaches, I look forward to seeing our students return from their summer break and am excited to welcome the class of 2022. Our freshman enrollment has increased 5.3 percent from Fall 2015 to Fall 2018. Our percentage of incoming students from underrepresented populations continues to remain steady at 16 percent. We celebrate the diversity of backgrounds, viewpoints and learning opportunities as we prepare our students for the world.

We are pleased that our fall to fall retention rate for our students is also tracking well, with preliminary fall 2017 to fall 2018 retention at 84.5 percent. Final figures won't be in until October. And to assist our students with the financial costs of higher education, we have been able to provide more than \$2 million in scholarships in the past three years.

It takes many hands to assist our students along the paths that they have chosen to tread. I appreciate the hard work of Associate Dean Larry Grabau and his team in the Center for Student Success, as well as the academic coordinators and all faculty and staff who assist our students along the way. It is the people within this college that make it shine; as a land-grant university program, we try to be better with each day that goes by.

Fall is a time of transition for students and their families as many leave their

homes for the first time to pursue the next phase of their lives. It is also a time of transition for our college. New faces will be joining our faculty and staff while others will move on to other positions here or elsewhere or transition into retirement.

There have been transitions in the college's administrative team as well. Associate deans Steve Workman and Lisa Collins are retiring and Rick Bennett has moved to the Department of Plant Pathology. Congratulations to the **2018 CES Summer Interns!** This year, we had 37 interns working and learning throughout the state. The internship program serves as a pipeline to strengthen knowledge and skills, and to prepare interns for future full-time positions within our system and beyond. Thank you to the intern supervisors for giving these college students the opportunity to learn how the Cooperative Extension Service makes an impact at the local, state and national levels.

The **Community Assessment** process has officially begun with five pilot counties: Boone, Christian, Clark, Madison and McCracken. These counties are testing the process, before rolling out the Community Assessments statewide in September.

Thanks to the 4-H agents and staff that helped make this year's **4-H camping season** one of the best yet. Agents and staff have diligently worked to increase the number of attendees. So far, more than 8,000 youth have attended camp this summer. That's an increase of more than 12 percent from last year. Final numbers will be available soon.

Associate Dean for Research

We asked Bob, associate dean for research, to share a little about his passions, his career path

Tell us about your background and what led you to your current role at UK?

I have three degrees in Horticulture, two from Michigan State and one from the University of Florida. I came to UK Department of Horticulture in 1985. I started a research program in basic aspects of photosynthesis and focused on a class of enzymes known as protein methyltransferases.
