

Message from the Dean



This month I would like to address some central university efforts that are impacting our college along with the rest of the university. We have been provided the opportunity to seek central support for online programs. I would like to thank our faculty for responding with some creative programs that received support from the university. Our college contributed to 11 proposals and five were selected to move forward. Those not selected are still in the running for later support.

The Center for Student Success helped our faculty to prepare for developing more online offerings, because that office is consistently evaluating and reevaluating courses, program offerings and degree opportunities. Proposed degree and certificate programs are under consideration and several not yet approved for funding by the provost's office will be funded in-house. Some of these are new programs while others are already available in the classroom setting.

Two new proposed online master's degree programs within the college are the Science Translation and Outreach Program and Entomology. These two programs will join the existing online master's degree in Retailing and Tourism Management that has been offered since fall 2017.

Two new proposed graduate certificates, Positive Youth Development and Family

and Consumer Science, are being developed. College faculty are also partners with the Colleges of Medicine and Health Sciences in a new Nutrition Certificate for Health Professionals.

Additionally, the faculty of our existing Distillation, Wine and Brewing Studies undergraduate certificate and Food Systems and Hunger Studies undergraduate certificate plan to offer online options.

These new master's degrees and certificates will aid students who wish to continue their education but cannot do so within the traditional classroom setting. This includes our colleagues who serve as agents in the Cooperative Extension Service. This is particularly important due to changes made by the General Assembly to the employee education program. You will recall that under this change, faculty and staff employed at Kentucky's public institutions are no longer able to take classes at another institution without paying tuition. However, UK announced a transitional three-year program this spring that will continue to pay for those already taking classes at another institution.

One characteristic of these new online programs is the fact that the college will get a majority of net tuition revenue for the new program. This is a different incentive system, providing a distinct reward for growth. Online offerings are one important way to grow university revenues in a time where we have had consistent cuts from the state.

Of course, the most important benefit is that of aiding many people in their desire to continue to learn and advance in their careers. The plan is to begin offering these programs by next fall. But, there are many approvals yet to be attained. I appreciate the quick work and diligent efforts by our faculty to develop these online options and to guide them through the approval process. I also appreciate the work of Larry Grabau, associate dean for instruction, for his guidance and insight.

As we wrap up another year in the College of Agriculture, Food and Environment, we celebrate many successes in 2018, and we look forward to 2019.

We asked Susan to share a little about her passions, her career path and what led her to us.

Tell us about your background and what led you to your current role at UK?

Growing up in Monroe County, I was very active in 4-H. That's how I learned about UK and decided I wanted to attend college here.
