So how'd it get that name?

Two UK entomologists Michael J. Sharkey and Eric Chapman, have described 10 new genera and many more new species and combinations of parasitic wasps. The resulting paper was published this spring in the open access journal *ZooKeys*. Among the newly described species are wasps named after two entomology students: *Leurogathis paulbakeri* and *Scabagathis emilynadeauae*. Both Paul Baker and Emily Nadeau had the highest scores in tests in a 2015 Entomology class. Paul is Ph.D student and lab technician. Emily is a graduate research assistant and expects to complete her master's degree this year. So the moral here – do well in class and you will have the satisfaction of a job well done and maybe even get something named after you.

Middle and high school students descend on CAFE

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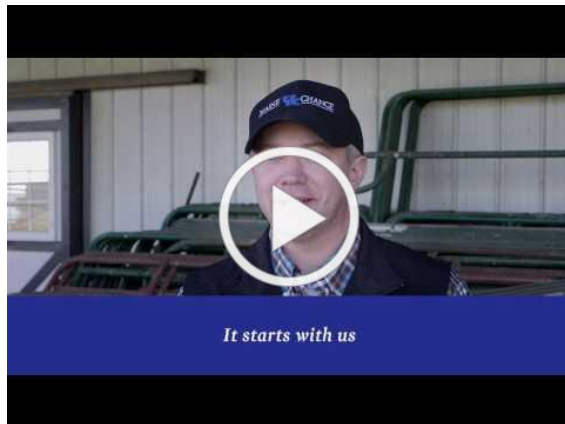


Inclusive Excellence Award
